SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT GOALS

A Year of Innovation and Impact

In 2024, Health & Help continued to make healthcare accessible to thousands, strengthened our clinics, and expanded community-driven initiatives. Aligned with the UN Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), here's what we achieved together:





Advocating for Global Healthcare Equity

Represented our communities at the UN General Assembly to raise awareness and ensure underserved communities' needs are recognized by international policymakers.

Our representatives from Health & Help, Ekaterina Stukonog and Ekaterina Korneeva, contributed to important discussions on improving healthcare access for vulnerable populations in Guatemala and Nicaragua.



Healthcare Services

Guatemala: Serving a region of nearly 20,000 people, we provided 2,393 medical consultations in 2024.

Nicaragua: Our clinic supports a community of approximately 5,000 people, delivering 1,424 medical consultations this year.



Strengthening Clinics& Working Conditions

Installed new equipment: solar battery, water pump, refrigerator, washing machine, motorcycle.

Upgraded furniture to enhance comfort for patients and staff



Empowering Communities

Healthy Food Initiative aimed to provide direct food aid for large families (Nicaragua).

Beach Cleanup Campaign (Nicaragua).

Educational Events for children addressing basic hygiene care and healthy eating habits (Guatemala).





Investing in Local Talent for Sustainable Impact

60% of clinic personal are local professionals.

Goal: Increase this percentage by hiring more qualified local staff and offering competitive salaries to ensure high-quality, sustainable healthcare.

Our dedicated on-site staff includes experienced local professionals and essential team members from other regions who help run our clinics efficiently.



Strengthening Fundraising & Donor Relations

Reconnected with all major donors through optimized fundraising processes.

Integrated our website donation platform with Salesforce, allowing real-time tracking of donations from the past three years.



Commitment to Transparency

Health & Help received the Candid Platinum Seal of Transparency — the highest level of recognition on the GuideStar platform — for the second consecutive year.



Volunteer contribution

In 2024, 41 volunteers worked on-site:

24 in Guatemala and 17 in Nicaragua.

Plus 28 virtual volunteers working remotely. **Total Contribution:** Over 142,000 volunteer hours.

CHUINAJTAJUYUP

Who we help:

The region where Health & Help operates is a part of the **Dry Corridor**, an area affected by prolonged droughts, food insecurity, and high malnutrition rates. Chronic malnutrition affects 47% of children under five (World Bank, 2022; WFP, 2024). Poverty is widespread, with over 66% of the rural population living below the poverty line (ENCOVI 2023, INE Guatemala).

The community relies on subsistence farming, primarily growing corn and beans, with limited access to healthcare and clean water. Due to poor road conditions, a trip to a medical facility can take hours, often on foot or using makeshift transportation.



Barriers to Healthcare

in Rural Guatemala:











Difficult travel to healthcare facilities:

Many patients walk for hours or rely on makeshift vehicles to access the nearest clinic.

Severe doctor shortage:

With only 1.3 physicians per 1,000 people, medical care is often unavailable in rural areas (WHO, 2020).

Language barriers:

Many indigenous patients speak Mayan languages, making it difficult to receive proper care in Spanish-speaking government hospitals.

Low healthcare funding:

Guatemala's healthcare spending per capita is only \$340.96, far below Costa Rica (\$948.92) and Mexico (\$610.65) (World Bank, 2021), limiting the availability of hospitals, medicines, and trained medical staff.

High maternal and infant mortality rates:

Guatemala has a maternal mortality rate of 95.5 per 100,000 live births and an infant mortality rate of 18.8 per 1,000 live births (PAHO, 2024) — more than double the rates in Costa Rica.




Health & Help has provided lifesaving medical care, maternal health services, and chronic disease management to approximately over 21,000 people, ensuring that patients in Chuinajtajuyup receive the care they need — without financial barriers.



LA SALVIA

La Salvia, a coastal fishing village in the Gulf of Fonseca area, is home to nearly 5,000 people.





While there are ongoing efforts to strengthen the public healthcare system, communities like La Salvia remain geographically isolated, making it difficult for residents to access consistent medical care.

Health & Help plays a vital role in ensuring that patients receive healthcare within their own community, free of charge.

Who we help:

Most of our patients are between 25 and 50 years old, with 60% being women, often seeking care for their children. A typical household consists of 3 to 5 family members with limited access to clean water.

Income is unpredictable: While Nicaragua's official minimum wage for the fishing sector is \$7.9 per day (Ministry of Labor, Nicaragua), many families depend on direct sales of what they fish and grow. This influences access to healthcare and essential goods.

Many rural communities are geographically isolated, and reaching basic medical care can cost up to \$30 per trip — nearly four times the average daily income.

The community relies on local fishing and small-scale agriculture, with households adapting to seasonal variations in income and food availability.

Common health issues include respiratory infections, cardiovascular diseases, gynecological and urological infections, and limited prenatal care.

Miguel's Story

(Chuinajtajuyup, Guatemala)

At just 7 years old, Miguel was brought to our clinic by his mother with persistent fever, worsening cough, and difficulty breathing. His family relied on an improvised fireplace for warmth, exposing them to smoke and cold, while chronic malnutrition made him more vulnerable to illness.

By the time he reached us, his oxygen levels were dangerously low, and his respiratory rate was alarming. Without access to a chest X-ray, our team relied on clinical expertise to diagnose and stabilize him. He received oxygen therapy, IV fluids, antibiotics, and nutritional support.

After just three days, Miguel's condition had improved — his fever was gone, his breathing had normalized, and he was well enough to return home. His case is a stark reminder of how lack of access to basic healthcare can turn a treatable illness into a life-threatening emergency.





Doña Justina's Story

(La Salvia, Nicaragua)

Doña Justina González Rodríguez, a 42-year-old woman from the remote community of Tigüilotada, faced a difficult journey to receive proper medical care. Her village has no electricity, no clean water, and impossible roads, forcing residents to travel on horseback for hours to reach the nearest health center.

After days of feeling unwell, she suspected she was pregnant and undertook a grueling six-hour journey on horseback to a public clinic. There, a doctor performed a pregnancy test, which came back negative. Without further examination, he offered her a contraceptive injection — but Doña Justina hesitated and refused. Determined to get a second opinion, she set off on another long journey to Health & Help's clinic in La Salvia.

At our clinic, Dr. Brian and our administrator-nurse Orlando conducted a second test and an ultrasound, which confirmed her pregnancy. Overwhelmed with relief and joy, Doña Justina left with essential supplements, medication, and a follow-up plan to monitor her pregnancy.



WHERE YOUR DONATIONS GO TOTAL TOTAL








OUR FUTURE PROJECTS

Projects for Targeted Funding

Before anything else, your donations keep our clinics open — covering essentials like medicine, staff, and electricity. Only after these basic needs are met can we begin funding the special projects below. With your help, they can become a reality.




Expand HPV Screening, VIA Testing, and Women's Health Services

Early cancer detection reduces mortality rates and improves long-term health outcomes for women in underserved communities.

Funding Need: \$20,000 for medical equipment and staff training.

Plan for 2025: Launch pilot HPV and VIA screening programs in our clinics. With our growing patient base, we aim to integrate women's health screenings into 6,000+ consultations annually.



Expand Breast Cancer Screenings and Women's Health Initiatives

Many women in our communities lack access to screenings, despite early detection being crucial for survival.

Funding Need: \$2,000.

Plan for 2025: Launch monthly women's health clinics focused on breast cancer awareness and early detection.



Expand Diabetes Prevention& Treatment Programs

Diabetes is a growing health challenge, and access to screening and treatment is limited in rural areas.

Funding Need: \$20,200 for insulin, medical equipment, community outreach program.

Plan for 2025: Launch a diabetes screening and prevention program to improve early diagnosis and management.




Implement a Digital Medication
Tracking System

Digitizing medical records prevents medication errors and ensures patients receive the correct treatments.

Funding Need: \$20,000 for software development and implementation.

Plan for 2025: Identify and implement a digital system to improve efficiency and safety in patient care.



Take Care of Our On-Site Volunteers and Staff

Supporting medical volunteers helps us retain skilled professionals and treat more patients in both clinics.

Funding Need: \$10,000 for essential equipment and facility improvements.


Plan for 2025: Upgrade living conditions to encourage long-term volunteer retention.
